Early learning and child care continues to be an exciting and rewarding profession. On a provincial level, we have a new streamlined funding formula that allows municipalities the opportunity to plan and fund a system responsive to the community that they serve. The *Ontario Early Years Policy Framework* was released early in the year and honours children, families and professionals as partners. New legislation, currently in second reading at Queen's Park, and the promise of a curriculum framework for Early Learning and Child Care will guide our daily practice with children. We are also extremely proud of Lorrie Baird, Associate Executive Director at KCCS, and co-author of one of the research papers in the *Think, Feel, Act: Lessons from Research about Young Children* document published by the Ministry of Education. The article highlights the work we have been doing at KCCS on Pedagogical Leadership. Within KCCS, we continue to build a greater shared understanding of our Guiding Values and how they can impact our practice with children, families, staff and community. Embedding these principles into administrative protocols, as well as into our programs, has been a focus this year that has been rewarding and inspires us to want to do more.

Over the past 8 years, Kawartha Child Care Services has been developing an organizational culture based on our values. Our original Program Values were developed collaboratively with our staff, as each program thought about what they wanted for the children in our care, the families and ourselves. These values became a launch for our 2012 Strategic Plan which included Guiding Values. What does it mean to believe in social justice and what are democratic principles? These have been the questions that we have asked ourselves and reflected on in 2013.



The challenge of recruiting and retaining RECEs continues as Full Day Kindergarten is implemented. In response, and because we believe our staff deserve more, we have increased our compensation package for staff. New incentives in 2013 included RRSP contributions, combining of personal and sick days so new staff have 10 personal days and 10 vacation days, up to 4 weeks unpaid leave which can be prorated across the year, and an extensive orientation and professional development program. Performance Reflections rather than Performance Appraisals also give staff an opportunity to participate in a strengths-based approach that builds on their strengths and the power of team work.



### President & Executive Director Message



Through partnerships and team work, we achieve far more. We are discovering that working together on systems issues leads to innovative and creative solutions to problems, within the classroom and throughout the organization.

Building positive relationships within our teams and in our communities has been a great experience this year. We have taken our documentation and experiences of children's learning to the community at conferences and coffee shops, hospitals and police stations, neighbourhoods and city centres. This has helped our communities understand more about our work and the brilliance of children, and given our children a sense of true community.

Kawartha Child Care Services continues to grow programs as well. In 2013, we added 3 new school age programs, 2 new infant programs and new spaces in many of our existing programs. We also welcomed the Investing in Quality Program to our administration space. This program is a community-based support to early learning and child care programs in the City and County of Peterborough.

Being intentional in our work brings us the rewards we are seeking. Our process of setting budgetary goals has helped us to realize a strong pedagogical structure, beautiful spaces for children and staff, competitive compensation practices and a culture of reflective practice and lifelong learning consistent with our Strategic Plan. In 2013, we have the leadership of a strong Board of Directors. Their thoughtful reflection on the direction and vision of our organization guides our daily work. Thank you so much for your time, energy, passion and dedication on behalf of children and families.

Our staff, as always, is amazing. You are the heart of our organization, fulfilling the promises made in our Strategic Plan. Many, many thanks to each and every one of you who have contributed to our success. We look forward to working and playing together in 2014 and beyond.

## MINISTRY OF EDUCATION UPDATE

#### Ministry of Education Documents Important to the Work of KCCS

In November 2007, the Premier asked Dr. Charles Pascal to recommend the best way to implement full-day learning for 4- and 5-year-olds. With Our Best Future in Mind: Implementing Early Learning in Ontario outlined for the government how this could be done. 20 recommendations were made in this report. Many of these recommendations have been implemented; some are on the cusp of being implemented and still more are in the works. Most significantly for KCCS, this report recommended that child care move to the Ministry of Education, as well as all Early Years programs, and that an Early Years Division be created within the Ministry. This has all been implemented. In addition, the recommendation to create a full day kindergarten program across the province will be fully implemented this fall.

Early Learning for Every Child Today (ELECT), also known as the Early Learning Framework (ELF) is a guide to support curriculum and pedagogy in Ontario's early childhood settings, including child care centres, kindergarten classrooms, home child care, nursery schools, Ontario Early Years Centres and other family support programs and early intervention services.

Statement of Principles is based on beliefs, values, experience and current research findings and are:

- 1. Early child development sets the foundation for lifelong learning, behaviour and health.
- 2. Partnerships with families and communities strengthen the ability of early childhood settings to meet the needs of young children.
- 3. Respect for diversity, equity and inclusion are prerequisites for honouring children's rights, optimal development and learning.
- 4. A planned curriculum supports early learning.
- 5. Play is a means to early learning that capitalizes on children's natural curiosity and exuberance.
- 6. Knowledgeable, responsive early childhood professionals are essential.



A tool to support practitioners' understanding of child development is included in ELF's document. This tool, the *Continuum of Development*, supports the abilities of early childhood practitioners to observe and document children's activities and interactions in order to plan the curriculum and talk with families and other caregivers.

The section called *Into Practice* helps early childhood practitioners anchor what they do with respect to the six principles and an understanding of child development. At KCCS we study and reflect on the principles and how we practice them every day in our work with children and families through a Communities of Practice model of professional development.



## MINISTRY OF EDUCATION UPDATE



The Ontario Early Years *Policy Framework* builds on the vision for the early years to ensure children from birth to age six have the best possible start in life. The framework is supported by a set of principles and is meant to provide strategic direction to our early years partners both within and outside of government. Moving forward, the Ontario Early Years Policy Framework will guide our collective approach to the development and delivery of early years programs and services for children and families. The four guiding principles are:

Programs and services are centred on the child and the family.

Programs and services are of high quality.

Strong partnerships are essential.

Programs and services are publicly accountable.



Ontario's Early Years Curriculum Framework (EYCF) is a professional learning resource to support early years curriculum development and pedagogy. The EYCF is centred on children, families and educators and the four foundations that ensure optimal learning and development. These foundations, along with the guiding principles of ELECT, inform the EYCF goals for children and expectations for programs.



Every child has a sense of <u>belonging</u> when s/he is connected to others and contributes to their world.

Every child is developing a sense of self and health and wellbeing.

Every child is an active and <u>engaged</u> learner who explores the world with body, mind and senses.

Every child is a capable communicator able to <u>express</u> him or herself in many ways.

## **Operations Report**

The first year as Operations Director has been exciting, one of growing and learning. I had the wonderful opportunity of bridging connections, building relationships and supporting new opportunities. Our Administration team began the year by reflecting on how we welcome families, staff and community members into our space. We began by creating a more welcoming entrance. We updated our vision statement and ended the year by creating an identity wall of pictures - people who live in this office. In 2013 our team of supervisors, staff and administration worked together to open five new licensed FDK classrooms and two new infant programs. We built budgets, prepared proposals, ordered toys and equipment, set up classrooms and hired staff. In September we successfully opened beautiful, rich and inviting classrooms to families and children in Durham Region, City of Kawartha Lakes and the City and County of Peterborough.

Over the past several months we have been revisiting our Operational Policies and Procedures. Our hope is to better align our policies with our strategic plan and guiding principles.

At the end of the year the Ministry of Education introduced a new online Child Care Licensing portal. We now receive all licensing information and report any serious occurrences through this portal.

#### Our staff team of over 200 are the key to our success.

Leadership emerges from all aspects of our organization with each staff taking pride in the skills, knowledge and abilities that they bring to their role. Our daily work is reflective of our shared values about relationships, wellbeing, environments and experiences. Teamwork is evident throughout our organization: Professional Advisory, Health and Safety, Communities of Practice, Leadership and Programs work collaboratively to realize our strategic plan and deliver excellence in early learning and care.

#### **HR Report**

2013 saw many changes in our HR practices as we strive to align them with our KCCS Guiding Principles. The Hiring Protocol developed in 2013 improved consistency and efficiency in the hiring process. Supply On-Call staff are now interviewed in a group setting, allowing the candidates to learn about KCCS and us to learn about them. At the end of the interview the candidates reflect on the process and link it to our guiding principles.

The success of the changes to our benefits in 2013 was measurable as demonstrated during our renewal meeting with Health Source Plus. We bundled our paramedical coverage to total \$1000/year coverage for one or more practitioners. This allowed people to take a preventative approach to wellness and as a result drug and prescription costs decreased. Permanent staff are able to "buy into" up to four weeks of unpaid leave, which is prorated over 24 pay periods. In 2014 57 staff are taking part, totalling 112 weeks.

KCCS is currently sponsoring five Child Development Practitioner Apprentices at three different colleges. Two staff have recently completed their apprenticeships; both of them have just returned from maternity leave. Congratulations to Tammie and Missy!

The supply registry was introduced in our community by the Investing in Quality Committee. KCCS was chosen to be one of the pilot organizations and is committed to this initiative. We have the ability to post and fill a staff absence; supply staff is able to work at different locations.

The finance team is pleased to report that KCCS had a successful year. In 2013 our two main areas of focus were accounts receivable and reinvesting in KCCS facilities. By working together to improve understanding and management of our accounts receivable, we were able to build stronger relationships between co-workers, departments and families while helping families manage their monthly financial commitments to KCCS. Together, we were able to reduce the parental accounts re-

ceivable from 9% of fee income in 2012 to 8% in 2013, despite an overall growth of 12% for fee income. I would like to extend my appreciation to the Program Supervisors and Tracy, Accounts Receivable for their efforts over the past two years to accomplish this success.

Careful budgeting, extra health and safety funding, and prudent use of resources enabled us to reinvest in KCCS facilities and personnel by upgrading our technology for documentation of children's learning and administration of our programs, and renovations to many of our programs and administration office.

We look forward to the coming year as we continue to improve the accounts receivable and look deeper at our financial systems to find efficiencies to more effectively serve families and children.






## WELLBEING

As part of our commitment to learning, we continue to network with a growing number of organizations that share the same commitment to children and families. In June, eleven educators from our organization were participants in an art institute in London, ON. This institute offered the opportunity to consider and build on our own experiences with art as representations of our thinking and learning. This experience helped us to consider children's creative representations and to help us to understand the depth of the logic and imagination portrayed in their work.





In February, Dianne Traynor and Angela Hoar, Pedagogical Team Leaders, joined 32 other delegates from across North America and Australia for an exciting conference and study tour in Auckland, New Zealand. Through seminars, presentations and center tours with NZ colleagues, university faculty, center staff and the NZ Ministry of Education, they explored the rich bi-cultural Reggio inspired curriculum. Upon their return, Dianne and Angela offered an evening of reflection to the educators here at KCCS and presented a visual tour of New Zealand's beautiful outdoor learning environments at the Annual General Meeting in April. This experience continues to impact the daily practices throughout the organization.



In June, 15 participants were given the opportunity to hear Jim Grieve, Minister of Education – Early Learning Division, offer a keynote address on the *Early Learning Framework*. This informative keynote was followed by a two-day institute presented by Anne Marie Coughlin and Lorrie Baird who guided educators and administrators from across Ontario to consider how we might bring visibility to the vision of our province. They offered a reflective model for helping to connect to values in order to make meaning of our classroom observations through the Principles of the *Early Learning Framework*.






## **Pedagogical Orientation Series**

In 2012 Building Foundations Together, a pedagogical orientation for new staff, was developed by the Pedagogical Team to support new educators' understanding of the organization and our curriculum practices. We thank every educator who dedicated their time and focus to engaging in the journey with us. Together we now have an understanding of the value and importance of learning together through reflective practice, as well as the critical role we play in the lives of those we spend time with each day.





We continue to support learning and development by offering Communities of Practice (CoP) as a model for developing reflective practice. This year our extensive internal PD calendar included series on Numeracy and Literacy, Enterprise Talk, Early Learning Framework, and general reflective CoP with School Age and Leadership Teams. In 2013, Jim Grieve, Assistant Deputy Minister of Education - Early Years Division announced that Early Learning and Care programs can look forward to having a "curriculum" from the Ministry of Education in the very near future. While we don't know exactly what that may look like, we do understand that the Principles as outlined in the Early Learning Framework (ELF or ELECT) will be the foundation it stems from. It is an impressive framework that stems from some of the latest research on early learning and development. The framework itself mirrors our own values and beliefs at KCCS and will not replace our current



practice but rather closely compliment so much of the work that we do. At KCCS we have been proud of the leadership our organization has taken in Ontario's movement to building a high quality early learning and care system in our Province. Sheila Olan-MacLean sits on the Ministry of Education Professional Advisory Table and is the President of the Ontario Coalition for Better Child Care. Both Lorrie Baird and Sheila Olan-MacLean have been invited to share their thinking and perspectives as we move forward in our partnership with the Ministry of Education.



To support educators working in early years settings in their continuous professional learning, the Ministry worked with leading experts in the early childhood field to develop resources to support deeper thought into practices connected with the Principles of the *Early Learning Framework*. We are proud that Lorrie Baird is a part this group of experts selected by the Province. Lorrie Baird alongside her colleague Anne Marie Coughlin wrote the research brief on Pedagogical Leadership. ## PROGRAM REPORTS

KCCS Discovery Space has had a successful 2013. We continued living into our values and beliefs. The educators are still building strong relationships with families, community partners and our KCCS team. Discovery Space's enrollment continues to be strong in all the rooms. Our partnership with the community continues to grow. We are in constant collaboration with the Adult Education Center to provide supports to families that attend the school. Our strong relationships with outside agencies brought many referrals to our program in 2013.

Moving forward into 2014, we are excited to explore our visions for our outdoor space. We look forward to continuing to build relationships with our families and the community.




## City of Kawartha Lakes

2013 offered KCCS Peterborough another eventful year. Both ladies were required to lead the first double graduation ceremony at the centre, where we saw over 30 children leave for full day kindergarten. It was an incredibly emotional day with lots of memories shared and hugs given. The idea of the children leaving us so soon after we have just started to get to know them has become reality.

The fall brought us three new educators with Angel Brady and Erica Clyens-Nagy accepting positions in our toddler and preschool rooms. With Stephanie Springett giving birth to a beautiful little girl named Desiree in November, we have been fortunate to have Stephanie Ferguson step in as acting Assistant Supervisor for the duration of her maternity leave.

We are also pleased to welcome Corinna Krocker as our new pedagogical leader. Corinna spent a few months observing and getting to know each individual educator and their documentation styles. ## Peterborough County & City





2013 was another year in which the Shamrock team provided quality child care to the children and families in the Ennismore community. Throughout the year we let our values and beliefs guide us as we transitioned along with our community to full day kindergarten, collaborated with others through different professional development opportunities and enhanced our environments.

The transition to full day learning at the neighboring St Martin's school presented us with the challenge of decreased enrolment in our preschool room. However brain-

storming together resulted in unique advertising ideas and we are now celebrating our increasing enrolment. This transition also brought the opportunity to strengthen our relationships within the school and we are excited to be making connections with the kindergarten teaching teams as well as new administrative staff. Professional development provided us with other opportunities to make connections. This

year we hosted our first study tour which also coincided with ORA Days. We welcomed members of KCCS, staff from other community child care agencies as well as members of the Ministry of Education to come and reflect with us on our work. We continued to look closely at our environments, being thoughtful about what went up on our newly painted walls and presented materials around the room which were inviting and engaging.



Moving forward into 2014 we are excited to continue strengthening our relationships within the school, participating in professional development and enhancing our environments. With a new year comes new opportunity.

Peterborough city and county school age care continues to grow each year with extended day programs and the forging of new partnerships. We have ten amazing programs in our communities. In addition we welcome a new partnership with St. Joseph's Elementary School in the community of Douro. What started as a small program is growing at a fast rate with continued interest and increasing enrolment.

Our school age programs focus on intentional play-based learning, supporting children's learning through their curiosity and explorations, and collaboration with children and adults while supporting relationships and social development. The ELF Principles and our own Guiding Principles guide our practices.

School Age Programs

Our solid commitment to adult learning and development this school year has resulted in an increase in internal professional development for School Age educators. Our Pedagogical leadership supports us to deepen the way we think about our work, the spaces we create for children and our relationships with children, families, colleagues and the community. Together we have been observing how children use space and materials and how they respond to their environment. Through this work we have re-shaped our thinking about our environments and the materials we offer children.

PVNCC School Board extended an invitation for collaborative learning with full day kindergarten/extended day classroom



teams by participating in professional development together. This was a great opportunity for dialogue around building a learning community and for making connections with our shared values and beliefs for children.

Moving forward we will continue to explore the latest research available and tools like that of the *Think, Feel, Act* document and *Early Curriculum Framework*. These documents will guide our practice in adult/child relationships, focusing on supporting children's self-regulation skills, creating environments that challenge children's thinking and building respect for materials. As always our documentation will continue to provide visibility of life in the programs.





## PROGRAM REPORTS - Home Child Care







Two Providers in the City of Kawartha Lakes area and three Providers in Peterborough joined the Home Child Care team in 2013.

Home Child Care is in the process of developing and revising policies and procedures and with that have come some changes to our Provider and Child Registration packages. At our annual policy review meeting Providers had the opportunity to reflect together on what they thought was important to be in the Provider Contract.

An annual Parent Survey was distributed in March for feedback on our strengths and areas for improvement. The surveys that were returned to us indicated that parents appreciate that our Providers are passionate about caring for children. Parents feel our providers are very good communicators, verbally and through the use of journals, and that their children are in safe, happy, comfortable environments. Suggestions for improvements were also made, and we have listened and made changes in those areas.

Professional Development was a success again this year. Book Study with some of the City of Kawartha Lakes Providers, as well as a Book Study in Peterborough took place early in the year. We were able to attend the POND Conference, First Aid and CPR, 2013 CKL Haliburton Conference and the 2013 Peterborough Child Care Conference. CKL Providers have had an incredible opportunity to attend a Nutritional Workshop with Betty Smith, Victoria Graduate's Nutritional Specialist. This is something that will continue every other month as the Providers found it very valuable.

We received our new License in September. The Providers who participated in the inspection felt that it was a valuable experience not only for the information they received, but the validation that they are providing quality child care in their homes. Norma has changed roles in KCCS; she is now the Pedagogical Team Leader for our Durham region. Jenny and Amanda remain as the contacts for the program and hope to continue to make this program a success.

KCCS Courtice has had a busy but wonderful year. We welcomed Shelley who is working in our school age program & Stacey in our JK/SK room. Norma is our new pedagogical leader; she has been working very hard with individuals as

2013 has been a busy and successful year at the Bowmanville program. We focused on centre renovations/expansion, opening a new satellite school age program and collaborating

KCCS Bowmanville opened a new infant room in September 2013, re-licensed new classrooms for our school age program and expanded the kindergarten school age program. Our license capacity increased from 93 to 112. All age groups continued to be operating at nearly full capacity.

The Harold Longworth School Age program, licensed for 46 children, was also opened in September 2013. Lindsay and Kirsty both transferred to this location and their professionalism & enthusiasm has made the experience very positive. The program continues to grow with enrollments already happening for fall 2014. The program has built relationships with the kindergarten teachers, Boys and Girls Club (who operate on site after school) and the Ontario Early Years who uses our room one morning per week for a school readiness program.

The Charles Bowman school age program continues to grow. We continue to share classrooms with the kindergarten teachers as well as a dedicated space for school age. Recently I had a meeting with the Principal and she commented on how Joselyn, the Site Supervisor, is so very accommodating, supportive and professional.

We continue to collaborate bi-monthly with Bowmanville, Courtice, Harold Longworth, Charles Bowman and Good Shepherd Programs with our Pedagogical Team Leader, Norma Curtis. This allows us the opportunity for reflection, team building and collaboration among all the educators. Over the last year all three programs have really strived to work with the schools to which we are linked to build relationships and open communication. We are continually growing and using more

and more school shared spaces so this communication and trust is very important. At the Bowmanville location we also built a relationship with Kingsway Arms Retirement Home. The children look forward to their regular visits and are becoming very comfortable in the space.






## PARENT ENGAGEMENT - ACCOLADES


