Executive Director's Message



It has been a busy, exhilarating, and productive year. The highlight was travelling to Italy which proved to be a life changing experience. I didn't know what to expect. I had read about the programs at Reggio Emilia, their values, their principles of education. As a team we had implemented the principles and had come so far with what we refer to as a journey of emergent curriculum. You see, we are never "there", at the end of the road. It is the journey that is important. So, I went to Reggio Emilia with a quiet confidence that KCCS was on the right road and that we were pretty well on our way to establishing programs that embodied the concepts of "Education for Democracy" and "excellence in early learning and care" and "strength based leadership".

What I found in Reggio Emilia was a way of life that was much deeper and richer that I ever imagined. Every person, every program, every building, every piece of equipment, every plant, every activity has purpose and value. Everywhere I looked and everything I heard reaffirmed the shared values and commitment to their positive image of every child, educator, family, parent, and administrator. Their commitment to a community based on democratic principles and love of their culture was evident in the architecture of their buildings, the selection of their furniture, their organizational structure and their daily interactions. In short, I went looking for strategies and found a way of living that holds every person in high regard for their competence and their worth. This was a place where teachers and children are researchers together, learners together and builders of a shared environment of discovery and wonder.

And what does this mean at KCCS? It means that every day we ask ourselves if we are truly walking the talk. It means that every day we are finding new ways of living into our best selves and supporting others to do the same. It also means that we are asking a lot of questions about how our values are visible in our programs. And we ask questions about how we value families every day and how we value each other and how do we demonstrate that every day. And so much more.









And so, in 2011, we embarked on a strategic planning process, which gave us the opportunity to really listen to what our colleagues, employees, community leaders and funders had to say. The final Strategic Plan document tells the story of where we want to be and how we want to live day to day.

This year Quebec's review of their early learning and care program gave us more irrefutable evidence that quality early learning and care is not only an investment in our children's future, but a strong economic investment as well. This program, in which families pay a maximum of \$7 per day, has earned the province \$1.40 in their GDP for every dollar invested. The federal government gets .40 for the province's efforts. In addition, the child poverty rate has decreased by 50% since 1998, the year the program began. Still, we have debates regarding whether families and children in our community deserve high quality accessible child care. And still, less than 20% of children who require quality child care have access. Every day we have calls from families who are unable to find care for their children. It is heartbreaking to hear their stories. Quality child care is an entitlement that has vast rewards. "It takes a community to raise a child" has become a well known saying, but have we really embraced it in our province? It is time. Community investment in child care pays dividends for generations to come. As parents, grandparents, child advocates, we must put forward a collective voice to fund our children's future. Voting in our municipal, provincial and federal elections is the first step in letting our government know that child care is important. Telling our elected officials is the next step. A new website helps make this possible. www.childcarematterstome.ca makes contacting your elected official easy and direct. Please make your views known.

Child care is now under the Ministry of Education. Our hope is that this will lend credibility to the importance of early learning and care. The future of our children is counting on it.

Parent Survey Annual Report

Parent feedback is very important to us at KCCS. All year, our doors are open and we hope that families will let us know how we are doing well and what they would like us to do more of or start to do. Each spring, we offer our families an opportunity to have formal and anonymous feedback through our parent surveys. This year, we conducted our survey in February and March. The surveys, developed by the Professional Advisory Team, were offered online and in paper copy. Across the organization we received 360 responses to our survey. 29.2% were from School Age programs, 20.8% from Preschool, 24.4% from Toddler and 5.3% from Infant programs.

Parents were asked what aspects of our programs they especially liked. The top three responses were *My family needs are met* (83.6%), *The educator communicates consistently with me regarding my child* (67.8%) and *I am encouraged to visit the program whenever my child is present* (54%).

Just over half of the respondents were interested in hearing more about emergent curriculum through newsletters. 50 respondents indicated that they would be interested in sitting on a Family Advisory Group for their centre and 19 indicated that they would be interested in being a member of our Board of Directors. Communication was preferred at drop-off and pick-up time and through newsletters and email.

Parents were asked for comments regarding what we were doing well. Out of the almost 500 comments received about what we were doing well, 201 of them referred to program and curriculum and 190 comments were about the positive relationships that they experienced. 86 parents mentioned a specific educator and 65 comments were related to positive communication.

Families also commented on what they wished for in our programs. 45 comments were suggestions regarding our curriculum. 12 of these comments mentioned preparing children for school. Other suggestions included no video games, having designated space for before and after school programs and more arts and crafts. We had 35 recommendations regarding our outdoor space and improvements needed for our play yards and parking lot. Other recommended improvements included communication by email for children's work, journals, newsletters, administration including more payment options, fewer problems with invoicing, more timely newsletters and more affordable fees.

The results for the organization as a whole will be reviewed by the Leadership Team and the Professional Advisory Team. Each program's review will be led by the supervisor and Professional Advisory Team member. Individual program and organizational plans will be developed to support the strengths identified by parents and to build new ways of addressing the wishes. We wish to thank the families who were able to find the time to complete the surveys. This is one of the ways that we gain an insight into what your experience in our programs is like and how we can improve.

Learning and Reflecting Together

It has been an incredible year of learning and development in our organization. The dedication of staff and their desire to engage in professional development was amazing. Our internal calendar continues to foster the ideas of reflective teaching through communities of practice and studying the work of children together. This reflective model goes beyond traditional workshops that are offered and requires educators to delve deeper into their work and values they hold for children and to think across multiple perspectives using a focused protocol. The difference has been transformative. In March of this past year we also hosted a "Reflective Practice Learning Institute" with Deb Curtis that was opened up for our community to participate. We saw educators from not only our area but also from London, Ottawa, Toronto, and a large group from Sudbury. It was a great success and allowed us to not only showcase this conference model but also share the work of the educators in our own programs.

We continue to offer opportunities for external PD and see great value in learning from other communities. This year we saw participation from educators and staff in the New Brunswick Infant Toddler Institute, London Art Institute, Chicago Leadership Conference and Institute as well as the many local conferences. One of the most exciting opportunities we had this year was to participate in the Canadian Study Tour to Reggio Emilia. We have shared our reflections from this amazing experience below.





Reflections from Reggio Emilia

After years of study and months of anticipation a delegation from KCCS embarked on an incredible journey to attend the Canadian Study Tour in Reggio Emilia. The work of the schools in this small city in Northern Italy have garnered the attention of educators, administrators, political leaders and policy makers from all over the world for many years. Their study of early childhood and early education has also greatly influenced the work and thinking of our organization since 2005. To say that the experience was transformational would truly not do justice to the inspiration that each of us came away with. For many of us, coming back and trying to articulate the depth of our new understandings and how it has influenced us in our work, and in fact who we are, has been very difficult. However, each of us wanted to share a short reflection from our experience and the way in which we are now somehow changed. You will notice that some of these reflections are connected to some of the many quotes that were shared and that resonated with each of us.

We would also like to once again thank the Board of Directors for their commitment and support that allowed this experience to happen. We are so fortunate that to have a Board that truly believes in the value of this work.

When I think of my learning from the Reggio Study Tour some thoughts and images that are strongly vivid for me represent the deep respect for the culture of children and childhood, the visible belief in the rights for all children and the cultivation for learning. The first place my experience in Reggio has influenced is my view of time, and time with children. We live in a world where we seek quick answers and immediate results and I had to think about how this influences me and my daily practices with children and adults. Learning to change my behaviour and slowing down as an educator is the way to truly understand children's thinking and theories. Taking more focused time to listen to children (in many different ways) express themselves to explore their ideas has strengthened my relationships with children and their families. This small step or change in view of time and respect for time has redefined my understanding of my relationships and leaves me with thoughts around the meaning of "known full well", words I thought I understood but really did not until I could see the meaning of these words through my experience in Italy.

My experience in Reggio was extraordinary and surreal! While touring the city, I had an opportunity to see how the community lives, what their work/home life looks like and to understand their value of education and family involvement! When the presenters spoke they were so thoughtful, sensitive and inspiring. As overwhelming as it was at times, the intent of the information was so meaningful and really spoke to me. So many quotes resonated with me, but the top two were "The roots are in the community" and "How can we build a more democratic coexistence and a more global idea of citizenship?" The idea of working together, reflecting and collaborating with children, families and the community is what I value. Having the opportunity to experience a walk through the schools, seeing their environments, provocations, way of interacting, and viewing the documentation gave me even more admiration for this work that we do. I am so grateful to have had this experience, to enhance my journey in my learning and discovering myself! It is still a struggle sometimes to put into words what I had experienced, but I know that I make connections to my experiences at Reggio in my work daily.

In our work we give such strong value to making visible the work and words of the children. My experience in Reggio allowed me to delve deeper into this idea of making more visible the thinking of educators, and making our intentionality in our documentation more visible. It requires us to consider documentation as a verb rather than a noun. Documentation as a process that begins with our own curiosities and wonderings and allows us to think together, share perspectives as we study and make visible the ideas, theories and curiosities of children.





Dianne Traynor

Like so many others on the Canadian Study Tour, my experiences in Reggio Emilia have helped me to reflect on my life, my work, my family and my community. There were so many big ideas for me, but the most profound and moving were the ideas of metaphors and connections and choices. Again, like so many others, it is extremely difficult to explain the ideas and reflections in a few short sentences. However, it is easy to live into these big ideas and reflect on them and connect them to our daily practice.

"Deciding what to observe is always a subjective choice. Just because it's a subjective choice, it's still an act of love." (Presentation by Daniela Lanzi & Rossella Munari)

Everything in life is a choice and this is also true with observation and documentation. Every choice is a responsibility and it can be difficult to know what to pay attention to and what aspects to deepen. It is impossible to document everything, but to know that every important choice is still an act of love. I always knew that there was thought and intention and purpose in the ways of Reggio, but it is deeper than that. I am still sorting through the layers and depth of the metaphors and connections in all aspects of the study tour. Every time the group has gotten together to think about what we experienced, I am overwhelmed with emotion and excitement. All of our big ideas have connected and we are still making connections.

Pedagogical Leaders Report

Each day we, the educators and the children strive to make visible the complexities of thinking, the richness and challenge of shared perspectives and the love of learning and living together in this way. Together we study observations, theories and the hypothesis of the children and delve into rich and reflective dialogue with them and the educators to gain multiple perspectives. It is this process that motivates our thinking and brings our curriculum to life.

Last winter at the Peterborough program we were busy preparing for our visit from Deb Curtis. Aesthetic alterations to the environment included the revision of our junior and senior art centres and showcasing new ideas about respect for children's work. These areas were set up to replicate an art studio with palettes, an assortment of brushes and individualized areas to work. Easel lights were also installed to highlight these areas.

The infant room educators were a little nervous about their side-by-side experience with Deb but excited none the less. Of course the time Deb shared with us brought new ideas and inspiration not only to our centre, but to the organization, as was proven at the dinner.

We attempted a Valentine's Day surprise for the moms of the centre. Fathers were offered the chance to purchase flowers for their loved one that the children would then give during morning drop off. A few dads participated and everyone seemed to enjoy it. We will review the idea for next year.

Graduation approached quickly. The senior children were interested in reptiles and we were lucky enough to find a new exhibit at the Toronto Science Centre. It is such an incredible opportunity to take the children somewhere they may never experience and to incorporate questions and theories that they have formed in their time with us. We hope to make this end of year trip a tradition.

Summer brings summer camp. The inclusion of a new group of children and educators offered both rewards and challenges. We were fortunate to be able to bring the camp back into the school this year making it more accessible for everyone. The senior room joined camp children on outings to the zoo, bowling, the splash pad and Milltown Mini Golf. The end of the summer was celebrated with a carnival that included snow cone machines, popcorn, candy floss, a bouncy castle and many games. Such a great time was had by both the centre and the camp that a decision was made to make this a reoccurring event. At the conclusion of summer camp ideas on what would assist us in making summer camp more inviting and rewarding for everyone were discussed and documented to be used in 2012.

The hospital road has finally been completed and although access for adults seems to be easier we are still remembering with fondness our beloved walkway.

Because committees seemed to be so successful accomplishing goals set for the playground we established parent/educator committees for the Santa breakfast, spring cleaning, graduation, found materials, Early Childhood Educator Appreciation Day and the United Way Campaign. The educator in charge of each committee forwarded information to interested parents. So far these committees have participated in the United Way Campaign and the Early Childhood Educator Appreciation Day (which, because of the committee, turned into a week). Both events were great successes with parents taking the lead in fundraising with Mabel's Labels and appreciation journals being established for each room. Parent contributions made our teams that much stronger and the appreciation that much more heartfelt. Congratulations to them both.

They say third time's a charm and it seems to be true! We are excited to have Cameron join our team, greatly improving cleaning consistency and quality. He has really good relationships with both the staff and children.

Santa breakfast broke an attendance record this year. We had an incredible turn out and it was a huge success for the newly formulated committee. Nice job!

Finally, we are anticipating the arrival of 2 new sets of washers and dryers, approved through the city's health and safety budget. This will be such an amazing addition to the program! Presently only one of our washers works and our dryers need to be constantly checked and restarted. We look forward to trying these out soon.

KCCS School Age

The School Age programs have all increased in numbers this past year and will be increasing in 2012. In Peterborough, we have a school age team of 20 educators. This year all educators have the opportunity to participate in Professional Development which is proving to be beneficial to the work in the classrooms. Communities of Practice for Site Supervisors began this school year and has been very successful. Julie Thompson is our Pedagogical Leader and provides program support. Educators have weekly meetings at admin with Julie

and other school age teams to further their work and challenge each other's theories and ideas. Team meetings off site provide educators with the opportunity for undivided attention to curriculum and to focus on their work.

Having an on call before and after school educator has been a tremendous support allowing for more time to support teams and programs experiencing challenging behaviours. This year Megan being the on-call and Julie working with teams on their curriculum has provided strong support.

Stronger partnerships with the school community means more locations are offering space for the upcoming school year! Our summer camp program was consistently full in 2011. At the school board's request the summer camp program finished a week earlier than in previous years. Having that week for transition from summer camp to back to school was great.

Challenges are minimal and remain the same throughout child care. Staffing shortages are more of a challenge this year. Educators leaving for other employment, returning to school and maternity leave resulted in a higher staff turnover in 2011. We are going into 2012 understaffed with 2 more maternity leaves approaching.

We await the completion of the licensing of the kindergarten classroom at Prince of Wales and approval to move our JK/SK children into the classroom. We currently have the JK/SK children split between two groups in order to support the need for before and after school care for this age group.

KCCS Home Child Care

KCCS Home Child Care has grown three fold since January of 2011. We have surpassed our goal of 100 children and 27 providers (one returning from maternity leave in May) and 4 in process.

In May our program received a huge boost with the addition of Amanda Camacho, program assistant and part time home visitor. Amanda established a more accessible wait list and recently assumed the responsibility of

parent and provider billing. We have established a new financial system which will provide an accurate reading for billing each month.

Amanda's support has allowed more time to focus on provider maintenance, monitoring recruitment and orientation.

A number of providers have been supported in their goal of documenting children's big ideas. This will be a valuable process as we prepare for our partnership with the Ministry of Education. Goals of creating opportunities for new learning, establishing a new provider training/ orientation manual and supporting children's learning will help make KCCS HCC a visible and viable child care option for parents.

Program Highlights in 2011:

- 4 providers attended the CKL conference in Haliburton.
- Student Lynleigh Keat supported home child care for a 2

month placement.

- 3 provider nights were offered.
- An open house/Water Festival in July was well attended.

Future goals:

- Work with providers to continue the process of constructing high standards for learning and care of young children.
- Continue to market and recruit new providers who share our values and philosophy for learning and care.
- Establish and share sound policies and procedures with Home Child Care Agencies across the province.

KCCS Shamrock

Shamrock's enrolment has rebounded and was quite strong this past year, both in the toddler room and the preschool room. Our wait list is significant and is providing this program with future enrolment as children graduate. St.Martin's school is one of the last schools to offer ADL which is good news for our preschool numbers.

With increased enrolment came an increase in staffing - Nicole Kent, Missy Compton and Chris Barnes are the three full-time educators in our preschool program. Nick Siracusa (St.Martin's educator) has joined the Shamrock team, cooking when Missy is on the floor. A part-time site supervisor position was also created, allowing me to return to pedagogical support. Through several transitions this year the team of educators have remained a supportive, connected group, dedicated whole heartedly to the children, the families and KCCS.

A playground expansion was approved for a separate toddler playground to be built when the ground thaws in 2012.

We hosted two open houses for our families. The first was a Halloween Open House/Silent Auction for United Way; 70 people attended and approximately \$400 was raised. The second was our 7th annual Breakfast with Santa; over 80 people attended. The Shamrock preschool team applied for and was granted a side-by-side experience with Deb Curtis and the Pedagogical team in March; their completed work was presented at the celebration night. It was an invaluable experience for the educators and the results are still evident in their work, almost a year later. The preschool team is a thoughtful, reflective group of educators really focused on their work and its value in their children's learning.

On Dec.7th, we had our annual licensing review, with 100% compliance.

The technology dollars provided the forward-minded educators and children with an I-Pad and wireless router for documentation, as well as a new colour printer.

The playground expansion was approved by the Ministry of Child and Youth Services.

KCCS Apsley

In September Geri-Lynn Conjindos-Henry was hired as Site Supervisor, a permanent position. Geri-Lynn has been a dedicated educator on a contract basis with us for several years. In support of the ADL program in Apsley, a permanent part-time position was created for the extended hours program. Katrina McClelland is now in this position. Katrina has been with KCCS Apsley since it opened. Courtney McLeod is our School Age Educator.

Funding was approved for a summer student and Jessica McVetty joined our team for the months of July and August. Jessica was enrolled in the Fire Fighter program at the local Fire Academy. This placement proved to be a fantastic connection with the academy and the township. Fire education programs have been presented to our children as a means to build on the academy's public relations component and are an asset to both parties.

The Apsley program has experienced excellent parent satisfaction and feedback from the community. Referrals come in consistently and our enrolment for the future months is projected to be strong.

We have 2 strong, full time educators dedicated to emergent curriculum. The learning that takes place is displayed beautifully throughout the centre. Teachers and the principal have come in several times to tour and have commented on the work of the children and educators.

Geri-Lynn applied and was granted a side by side experience with the Pedagogical team. This experience really propelled her work in the classroom.

Our Summer Camp program was a big success, providing a program for 10-12 children daily, several of whom were cottage children joining us sporadically. All the participants found our program in the North Kawartha Township Directory, which is proving to be a valuable marketing tool.

Our Christmas Open House was a huge success; a total of 40 children and parents joined us for a festive night (last year a total of 5 people attended). This increase is partially due to an increase in enrolment but we feel it's more significantly due to the ongoing relationship we are forming with the community. The families in Apsley are becoming more comfortable with licensed child care and our presence in the community.

KCCS Apsley was licensed on Dec. 1. The review went very well with only one minor infraction, which was corrected immediately. Sandra Ross was very impressed with our program.

The provision of dollars for technology was an enormous benefit to the Apsley site. We purchased a wireless router, which provides the educators and children with much more flexibility for documentation and research. A digital frame, camera and memory cards were also purchased.

A shed will be installed in the spring once the ground thaws.

After a bit of a rocky start, (primarily trying to find a space) St.Martin's 2 opened September 6th; 20 children attend daily after school in the basement of the St.Martin's Church. I have received very positive feedback from families for the current team and programming.

The program continues to be a success.

2011 was a year of change.

Many wonderful and exciting internal and external PD were attended in 2011 (New Brunswick Conference, Halliburton Conference, KCCS Institute). A great deal of reflection and learning is evident in the classrooms. The center was privileged to have several side-by-

side experiences- twice with Deb Curtis and three times with the pedagogical team. Staff continued to expand on their skills while making the children's learning visible. Dianne in her pedagogical capacity has supported the learning at the centre, becoming a critical friend to many.

Everyone worked to develop the outdoor environment, adding a water and music feature, along with a teepee. During the summer months the school-age children participated in the second annual KCCS Amazing Race. Community knowledge and partnerships were expanded and de-

veloped further. The children in the school-age and best start programs participated in the annual trip to Cedar Park, fishing, local parks and this year Casa Loma.

The family open house and Christmas lunch had high attendances and were well received. A lot of teamwork went into the United Way campaign again this year; staff planned and implemented a variety of events/experiences (walk-athon, dinner to go, a yard sale, staff contributions, and more) to raise \$ 2,403.87 at the centre.

I have started to meet with the school principal on a monthly basis to develop community outreach and partnership. During the year the staff have become involved in the registration process, meeting with new families to get to know parents and children and open the lines of communication.

Enrollment was consistently high through out the year until November when the toddler enrollment started to decrease; staff was adjusted to maintain the budget. In July Michelle welcomed a third daughter to her family while Kelly-anne welcomed her second daughter on Christmas Day.

It was a great year and we are looking forward to new adventures and growth in 2012.

KCCS Bowmanville

Bowmanville overall had a strong year for enrolment and financially. We had a full program in every room every month except July and August when enrolment is typically a lot lower. Many of our families, especially of school age children, chose to withdraw these months, and we were unable to find new clients. I guess most families try to make do over the summer months.

We were given \$5000 for playground upgrades in the toddler yard. Difficulty in finding a contractor resulted in the job not being completed during the summer. Denise and I will continue to search for a contractor aiming for a Spring 2012 completion.

Charles Bowman School Age program opened in Sept 2011. The program opened with 2 staff and a few children. The program continues to grow monthly. Enrolment is closely monitored because if all the sporadic/part time children attend on the same day a 3rd staff is required. I support the program as required until the numbers are stable enough to hire another permanent staff. We will be licensing new rooms in early 2012 to meet the expanding numbers and the need to share space with teachers at this school. Ashley and Joselyn are doing a wonderful job operating this program with very little support. They are extremely independent, make sound decisions and continually try to build a great relationship with the new school.

We have continued to build strong relationships with many therapists at Grandview Children's centre as several children are receiving services - speech, physical and occupational therapy. Many parents calling for special needs care tell us that we have been identified as the leader in the community for this type of support. Many of the local centres do not provide care if outside support is required. We have continued to try to build strong relationships with Holy Family Elementary. We continue to attend many JK/SK assemblies and attend Christmas concerts etc. that happen during the day; our children have become the practice audience. It is a great experience for our children to attend these activities. The kindergarten teachers have been looking to us for support in Emergent Curriculum. They are asking questions and looking in our classrooms for ideas.

All the staff at Bowmanville continue to attend PD and it is visible in the program. Maryanne attended the New Brunswick conference in 2011 and 5 staff are attending the ORA conference in Feb 2012.
