# Raising The Bar

# Cooks' Networking

This networking group consists of the cook/housekeeper staff at each of our full day programs and a facilitator. It is an opportunity for the cooks to meet and dialogue about current best practices with regards to nutrition and food preparation.

In 2010 we met quarterly and had rich discussions about everything from cooking for children with multiple food allergies to how to most effectively utilize large portions of produce over long periods of time to retain nutrients. The group also supported cooks new to our organization by putting together binders that support time management in the kitchen as well as providing easy one-stop information for supply cooks and students. These binders consist of four weekly menus. Following each menu are the recipes for that week along with cooking instructions for the centre based on daily enrolment. Some cooks have also included a list of foods for these recipes for their weekly and bi-weekly food orders. One of the cooks said that the development of this book has proven to be very effective and she feels much more organized and efficient in her work.

In the spring we were able to make revisions to the Nutrition Policy. The cooks are extremely dedicated to providing nutritious meals as set out by these guidelines. So dedicated, in fact, that these changes were seen as easily attainable because of the high standards of nutrition that had already been established in their menus and food purchasing.

KCCS understands the importance of proper nutrition for the growing bodies and minds of young children and how much of an impact it has on their ability to think and learn. We appreciate the daily contribution cooks make in support of KCCS's mission and values.

# **Professional Development**

One of the major aspects of our organization that sets us apart from others in our community is our passion and strong commitment to ongoing professional development. We believe that to truly offer the best care and education for young children we must deepen our understanding of the teaching and learning process. A recent study (*Understanding Quality In Context*) found that the disposition of child care directors and their commitment to professional learning, and expectations of staff in relation to professional growth and development directly impacts the quality of care provided. There is also growing research and evidence that professional development can make significant contributions to enhancing and building a stronger relationship with children and families. There is powerful evidence that professional development is linked with positive impacts on outcomes for children in the areas of literacy, mathematical understanding, and scientific understandings.

As we have evolved in this work we have also come to know that not all professional development is created equal. Professional learning today must go beyond "drive-through training" and take a constructivist learning approach that mirrors our daily approaches with children. This past year we have revised our internal training and development, striving to offer sessions that promote this deep reflective practice. It was with great excitement that we designed and now offer a year long program for supervisors and educators, "Becoming a Reflective Educator" using a "Communities of Practice" (CoP) approach to learning. Essentially, Communities of Practice are mini learning communities. Participants come together in small groups to have focused dialogue and reflections. The sessions have a presenter and each small group has a facilitator to guide discussions. The groups stay together over time to build deep relationships with each other.

"Beyond networking, the purpose of these Communities of Practice is to engage in disciplined dialogue to uncover possible significance of their documentation of children's play and learning, implications for their teaching."

Building this culture where our practice is informed by reflecting together on our daily experiences and observations has allowed us to strengthen our skills as educators and in turn offer children and families programs that are truly based on children's interests, ideas and curiosities.

## **Outcome Measurement**

As a member of the United Way of Peterborough and District, KCCS has been participating in the Outcome Measurement program since early 2008. The Outcome Measurement project has been designed to support non-profit organizations to statistically measure and demonstrate the effectiveness of a program for participants. As our funding from United Way is allocated directly to our infant care program in Peterborough to offset the high cost of care, we moved forward developing the following outcome related to this program:

Children who participate in Kawartha Child Care Services Infant and Toddler programs demonstrate healthy social emotional growth.

To measure this outcome we used the Devereux Early Childhood Assessment for Infants and Toddlers (DECA IT) – strength based assessment which measures within-child protective factors in the areas of initiative, self control and attachment. The overall results of each of these scores are combined to make up a child's "total protective factors" score. Social and emotional outcomes are important attributes that children need to acquire to play well with others, to regulate their body (calm down), to build good relationships with peers and the adults in their lives and to initiate plans and make good decisions for themselves. Our goal was to measure the following indicators:

- The # of infants and toddlers that demonstrate typical or strong abilities to use independent thoughts and actions to meet their needs.
- The # of infants and toddlers that demonstrate typical or strong abilities to form long lasting, caring relationships with the people in their lives.

Our pilot group began with four children in 2008 and expanded to 30 children by 2010. The initial ratings for each child were taken one month after registration in the infant program and the final scores were taken in October 2010. The scores fall into a range reflective of area of need, typical or area of strength.

In 2005 KCCS embarked on a journey towards excellence in curriculum design, with the implementation of Emergent Curriculum. As part of this journey we implemented Primary Care into our classrooms. Primary Care essentially means that each child has someone special (primary caregiver) with whom he/she will be able to build a stronger, more intimate relationship. It is our belief, and research indicates that, primary care has a positive influence on children's social and emotional health and development. Our findings from this project prove just that. After careful data collection and analysis our final outcome reflects that: 96% of children who participate in Kawartha Child Care Services Infant and Toddler Programs demonstrate healthy social emotional growth.

Thank you to the committee, board members and staff who have worked many hours on this very worthwhile project.

We used to see busy activity .... Now we see the many languages unfold


We used to have children and families as our core value .... Nothing has changed!!

"The Pedagogista works to promote within herself and among teachers the attitude of learning to learn, the openness to change and willingness to discuss opposing points of view."

Today, we have the joyful and fulfilling opportunity to work and learn alongside the dedicated and thoughtful educators and children at Kawartha Child Care Services. Each day we, along with the educators and children, strive to make visible the complexities of thinking, the richness and challenge of shared perspectives and the love of learning and living together. Together we study observations, theories and the hypotheses of children, we delve into rich and reflective dialogue with children, and educators gain multiple perspectives. It is this process that motivates our thinking and brings our curriculum to life.



# **Program Reports**

#### Home Child Care

The Home Child Care Program continues to grow as a valuable child care option for parents and a career choice for those who want to share their lives with young children.

We receive an average of 10 to 15 calls per week. Parents consistently communicate their preference for monitored home child care. I believe there is work to be done on behalf of parents in advocating for licensing. I look forward to our involvement with the Ontario Home Child Care Association and the Coalition for Better Childcare. Presently, we have 10 providers in Peterborough and the surrounding area, 3 providers in the City of Kawartha Lakes, and 5 providers in the process of being approved by June 2011. All providers have been welcoming towards yet another supervisor. They are a resilient group of individuals and I find joy in every home I visit. I am thrilled that many of our providers are involved in professional development at KCCS and with other local agency sponsored initiatives. We had our first Provider Night in February, giving educators an opportunity to share

stories regarding the care of young children. Many offered their views of the future of home child care, given the potential loss of 4 and 5 year olds to the education system. As a group we decided it was important to continue to meet and share ideas for programming as well as celebrate the work that we are doing. This spring we will explore a few providers' homes on a road expedition.

Marketing Home Child Care has been a huge focus for us. I have received much support from our administrative staff at KCCS in developing and distributing a new flyer as well as developing ads on Kijiji. To date we have targeted Lakefield, Lindsay, Millbrook, East City and the city's west end.

I look forward to a year full of learning opportunities with providers, children and parents.

### Apsley

### School Age Programs

In 2010 the school age programs focused on our core values and worked proficiently on relationship building with children, families and the school community. ### Bowmanville
